Garden of Gratitude: Honoring the Nations of Freedom

Nestled in the heart of Seoul's historic Gwanghwamun Square lies the newly opened Garden of Gratitude, a memorial space dedicated to the 23 nations that fought alongside Korea during the Korean War. This remarkable site symbolizes sacrifice, freedom, and peace, offering visitors a chance to reflect on history while experiencing a modern cultural landmark.

At the center stands the striking installation “Lights of Gratitude 23”, composed of 23 stone pillars—some gifted directly by the participating nations. Each pillar represents the enduring bond forged in the fight for liberty. Beneath the square, the immersive Freedom Hall invites guests to explore multimedia exhibits, memorial walls, and stories of Korea's transformation from an aid-receiving nation to a global donor.

Conveniently located just steps away from Gyeongbokgung Palace, the Garden of Gratitude is easily accessible on foot. For visitors from the 23 nations who once stood shoulder to shoulder with Korea, this site offers a deeply meaningful stop during their journey through Seoul.

Whether you come to honor history, enjoy the evening light show, or simply take a reflective pause in the bustling city, the Garden of Gratitude is a must-see destination.

Freedom Hall: Media Walls of Memory



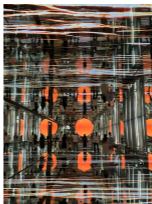
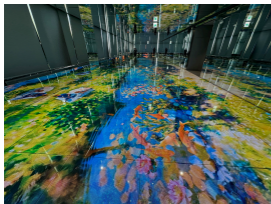
Beneath Gwanghwamun Square, Freedom Hall features four interactive media walls—including the Memorial Wall and Window of Connection—presenting 13 multimedia stories.

Art in the Sky: Discover 63 Sky Picnic



63 Sky Picnic Café: Starbucks with a Skyline



Perched atop the iconic 63 Building, 63 Sky Picnic offers breathtaking 360° degree views of Seoul. From this vantage point, visitors can see both N Seoul Tower and Lotte World Tower at once—an unforgettable panorama that captures the essence of the city's skyline.

Unlike the more famous observatories at N Seoul Tower or Lotte World Tower's Seoul Sky, 63 Sky Picnic remains relatively less crowded. This makes it an ideal spot for those who want to enjoy sweeping views of the city in a calmer, more relaxed atmosphere.

Located right on the banks of the Han River, it's the perfect destination to pair with a riverside picnic. After enjoying fresh air by the water, step into the sky for a new perspective of Seoul.



Inside, immersive media art installations transform the observatory into a living gallery:

- Immersive Media Theater: Hundreds of mirrors create infinite reflections of Seoul's skyline.
- Sky Voyage Theater: Five-sided screens simulate flights over world cities.
- Sky Stage: Holographic light spheres fill the space with ever-changing patterns.

Enjoy your coffee at the 63 Sky Picnic Café, the only Starbucks in Seoul where you can take in the city's full panorama.

From here, you'll see the entire skyline stretch across the Han River, with both N Seoul Tower and Lotte World Tower visible in one breathtaking view.
